

Gas leak response

A gas leak — whether from natural gas or liquefied petroleum — is extremely dangerous. It can lead to fires, explosions, severe injuries, or worse.

If you suspect a gas leak or smell gas in a building, follow these steps right away:

- 1. Get everyone out. Clear the room, building, or area immediately. Don't let anyone go back in until the area is confirmed safe.
- 2. Avoid anything that could spark. Don't use matches, lighters, phones, or anything electrical even flipping a switch can cause an explosion. Stay away from furnaces or appliances too.
- **3.** Shut off power safely. If you can, cut electricity from a safe, remote location to prevent automatic switches from turning on in the danger zone. Use flashlights approved for hazardous areas if lighting is needed.
- **4. Call for help.** From a safe location, contact your gas supplier and alert others in the area.
- 5. Ventilate if it's safe. Open windows and doors to help clear the gas—only if you can do so safely.
- **6.** Turn off the gas. Shut off the gas supply to the affected areas if possible.
- 7. Check nearby buildings. If the leak is strong, gas could drift. Investigate surrounding buildings to make sure they're safe too.



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
